Presidential Leadership

University of Maine at Farmington (2012-present)

The University of Maine at Farmington (UMF) is a small, selective public liberal arts college serving primarily traditional-age students in a residential setting. One of seven universities in Maine’s statewide university system, UMF offers B.A., B.S., and B.F.A. degrees to 1,820 undergraduates, 48% of them Pell-eligible. UMF also offers the M.S. Ed. degree to 260 part-time graduate students, primarily in-service teachers. UMF is a founding member and active participant in the Council on Public Liberal Arts Colleges (COPLAC). With a budget of \$39 million and endowment of \$13.7 million, UMF supports 375 employees, including 116 full-time faculty. UMF has consistently earned accolades for excellence and value from the Princeton Review, Campus Pride, Green Colleges, *U.S. News & World Report* (a “top five” public regional college in the North), *Washington Monthly* and College to Career.

As president my primary responsibility is to ensure the coordination, communication, development, collaboration, and creativity necessary to serve internal and external constituents and realize UMF's mission. I guide the full scope of university operations in academic affairs, student life, residential life, enrollment management, financial aid, budget and finance, campus facilities, athletics, university advancement, marketing, alumni affairs, and community relations. I also play a significant and active role in University of Maine System management and have assumed leadership roles in governance, strategy, academic affairs, and financial policy.

Reporting directly to me are the Provost/VP for Academic Affairs, VP for Student and Community Relations, VP for Enrollment and External Affairs, Chief Business Officer, Director of Institutional Research, and Director of the UMF Sustainable Campus Coalition. Others on my cabinet are a senior faculty member (rotating) and the Associate CIO for the University of Maine System, who is based at UMF. I report to the University of Maine System Chancellor and Board of Trustees and am advised by a 17-member Board of Visitors.

Key accomplishments:

- **Envisioned and guide development and implementation of *UMF 2020: Experience Farmington***, a mission-aligned, student-centered institutional strategy unanimously approved by the University of Maine System Board of Trustees in September 2014; initiated Farmington Fusion, UMF's commitment to high-impact, community-engaged, experiential practices
- **Achieved a 10-year accreditation** from New England Association of Schools and Colleges (NEASC), UMF's accrediting body, 2012; co-authored UMF's five-year interim review, 2016
- **Initiated enrollment governance and strategies and stabilized enrollments after a five-year decline**, including reforming an Enrollment Division (with a VP overseeing Admissions, Financial Aid, and Marketing) and creating a culture of recruitment and retention throughout the campus; established the Be Home/Come Home program to attract graduates from nearby high schools, the Farmington Fellows program (innovative recruitment for graduates of high schools in the nation's nineteen Farmingtons), the Discovery Fellows program for graduates of high schools led by UMF alumni principals, and the Farmington is Family program for children of out-of-state alumni
- **Steward campus financial resources** through careful budgeting, revenue generation, and expense control to deliver balanced budgets each year; regularly lead campus discussions to engage constituents in budget planning
- **Communicate regularly and effectively** to campus community, including students, faculty, staff, alumni, parents, external partners, media, and university friends; prepare and present information and engage discussions at All-Campus Meetings and topic-focused Open Sessions each semester; frequently share news, frame issues, and consult with students, faculty/staff, and alumni

- **Reformed UMF governance and processes**, including formation of Take Stock Task Forces, the UMF Staff Senate, the University Leadership Council (academic, student affairs, and administrative leaders) and Planning and Budget Advisory Council to formalize campus engagement in university affairs; **initiated and sponsored university-wide committees, action teams and recognition events**, including the Diversity and Inclusion Action Team, Art on Campus Committee, Community Connections Team, Distinguished Staff Awards, Book Authors Celebration, and Milestones Event
- **Bolstered university advancement** through development and reorganization of UMF's first formal advancement office, significantly increased grant submissions and awards, initiated and successfully completed targeted campaigns for college completion and athletic facilities
- **Chaired, raised funds for, and led implementation of UMF's 150th Anniversary Celebration**, a yearlong series of cultural, historic, academic, and community events in 2013-14
- **Oversaw completion of UMF's first campus master plan since 2002; improved function and aesthetics of campus facilities and grounds** through investment of over \$20 million in science labs, classrooms, lobbies, gymnasium, fitness center, student center, residence halls, admissions, Honors House, biomass heat plant, patios, and grounds

- **Exhibit personal and institutional values as a student-centered president**, assisting directly with recruitment, retention, and post-graduate outcomes, attending and celebrating performances, athletic contests, and events, meeting students through clubs, organizations, and residence hall gatherings, consulting with Senate officers, and participating in student-run events; in spring 2016, I taught a full-semester course, "Stand and Deliver: The Art and Practice of Public Speaking"
- **Burnish strong town-gown relationships** by engaging the broader community as university partners; co-sponsored Welcome Back Day; promoted UMF employees for community board

membership; presided over three-fold expansion of internships, service learning, and other leadership opportunities through the Partnership for Civic Advancement; deepened the purpose and impact of the UMF Board of Visitors; and sat on nonprofit governing boards, currently the Greater Franklin Development Corporation, JMG (formerly Jobs for Maine Graduates), and Maine Campus Compact

As chief executive officer, I directed the strategies and daily operations of a major university-based research and policy center at the University at Buffalo, State University of New York. I articulated the institute vision, managed eight to ten professional staff, forged and sustained internal and external relationships, raised and stewarded over \$3.4 million in external funds for a unit with an annual operating budget of roughly \$1 million, led intellectual and entrepreneurial project initiatives, served as chief media spokesperson, performed quality control, and represented the institute to university administrators, donors, clients, and partners in corporate, academic, government, philanthropic, and civic communities. Under my leadership the institute became a premier, award-winning, full-service regional asset for objective, evidence-based, actionable analysis on regions, governance, economic development, and binational relations.

Department Chair (2003-2005); Associate Chair for Undergraduate Education and Director of Undergraduate Studies (2001-2002), University at Buffalo Department of Urban and Regional Planning, Buffalo, New York

As department chair, I was responsible for operations and quality for graduate education (master's level Urban and Regional Planning degree, roughly 100 students) and undergraduate education (bachelor's level Environmental Design major and minor degrees, roughly 125 students). My portfolio encompassed half-time teaching and the full menu of departmental management, with final responsibility for strategic planning, accreditation, curriculum design, admissions and recruitment, financial aid awards, budget allocations and finance, annual performance reviews for full-time faculty (11) and staff (2), hiring and professional mentoring for adjunct faculty (16), capital facilities, and forging and maintaining strong relations with other departments, school and university administrators, faculty, students, parents, alumni, and external constituents. During my tenure, I organized and led the department strategic plan process, which laid the groundwork for a Ph.D. in planning program, conceived and designed a new J.D./M.U.P. dual degree program, undertook the first comprehensive assessment of our undergraduate Environmental Design program, and maintained the department's national professional accreditation.

As the inaugural institute director of research, I strategized and implemented research-based programming for a newly formed university-based center on regions and governance. In collaboration with professional staff and external partners, I developed the applied research agenda, trained staff and graduate assistants, coordinated and carried out projects, represented findings to the media, and delivered a full schedule of presentations to regional audiences. A key achievement was formulating, directing, and lead-authoring a major award-winning civic undertaking, *State of the Region: Performance Indicators for the Buffalo Niagara Region in the 21st Century*, a project involving over 200 community leaders and solidifying the institute as the region's premier center for high-quality, engaged public scholarship.

Grants and Fundraising

As UMF president I formed a Grants Committee to monitor and actively seek grant opportunities to further university initiatives. During my presidency, UMF received its largest grant in university history, a \$20 million award from the Department of Education for GEAR-UP, a program to boost high school completion and college readiness for which UMF serves as fiscal agent.

As of 2017, UMF is implementing over \$6.5 million in grants for projects supporting UMF Peer-to-Peer Financial Education, the Partnership for Civic Advancement, GEAR-UP, UMF's TRIO programs, innovative experiential learning, graduate education, math coaching, and campus facilities. In June 2017, UMF received funding from the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation to support the New Commons Project (newcommons.umf.maine.edu), a unique approach to advancing public arts and humanities.

Submitted and pending are over \$2.5 million in grants to support experiential education, university advancement, internship and leadership programs of the Partnership for Civic Advancement, and initiatives combatting campus sexual assault, domestic violence, and dating violence.

As director of the University at Buffalo Regional Institute, I led institute efforts to raise ~\$750,000 annually from external sources, primarily foundations, governments and the private sector. Additional grants activity focused on my role as co-grantwriter, co-PI, and associate director of “Building Resilient Regions,” a multi-year (2004-2013), three-phase, \$4.8 million grant from the John T. and Catherine D. MacArthur Foundation. My individual and small-team sub-contracts totaled \$948,725 for research, publications, and website development on regional governance and resilience capacity.

I have participated extensively in public service and civic activity in professional and academic positions. As UMF president I regularly give keynote and panel presentations to local, regional, state and higher education groups, contribute to civic conversations, participate actively on boards, and connect the university with community and business partners. As Regional Institute Director, I hosted regional events, sat on boards, participated regularly in dozens of public affairs programs, and delivered numerous keynote presentations throughout New York State. My role as faculty member in urban and regional planning placed me and my students in the community for many service and volunteer activities and class projects. In my career I have given hundreds of talks as keynoter, panelist or conference presenter to help inform or advocate.

Scholarship and Publications

My research focuses on governance and regions, including questions of regional identity, decision making, and leadership. Most recently I examined governance of regions with cross-state or cross-national borders. I have done extensive research and writing for a book project on metropolitan governance—suspended during my university presidency—which examines “metaphor” governance systems (European Union, National Football League, Iroquois Confederacy, University of California, Roman Catholic Church, General Motors, and the Internet) to draw insights and lessons for metropolitan regions. As a principal of the MacArthur Foundation Research Network on Building Resilient Regions from 2004-2013, I investigated the drivers of regional resilience in the face of economic, demographic, and technological change.

I have presented scholarly work in more than 100 lectures and academic and professional conferences, including invited addresses at MIT, Cornell University, Brookings Institution, Harvard University, University

of Pittsburgh (2011 Wherrett Lecture on Innovation in Local & Regional Governance), University of California, Berkeley, Federal Reserve Bank of St. Louis, Federal Reserve Bank of Philadelphia, and the University of Birmingham (U.K.). For many years I was a regular presenter at annual conferences of my professional organization, the Association of Collegiate Schools of Planning.
