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UMaine Farmington "Symposium Day," April 14, to Show-case Student Research and Creativity — Public Invited

FARMINGTON, MAINE (April 9, 2004) — One special day each spring, the University of Maine at Farmington community enjoys the opportunity to teach, learn, and "show off their learning," outside the usual classroom format.

It's all part of the University of Maine at Farmington's "Symposium Day 2004," an annual event in which the University cancels classes and replaces them with an entire day set aside to recognize the scholarly and creative works by UMF students and faculty. Symposium Day will be held Wednesday, April 14, beginning at 9:00 a.m., at various locations across the Farmington campus. The public is invited to attend.

This year, UMF students, faculty, staff, administrators, and people from the area community will see student and faculty presentations on subjects such as cloning, drug and alcohol abuse, global climate change, and much more. Attendees can follow an area of interest from venue to venue, or stay in one room and learn about a wide range of topics, such as Maine's responses to the atomic bomb and McCarthyism. Even NASCAR and World Wrestling Entertainment are subjects of this year's presentations.

In addition to academic and research projects, Symposium Day also features cultural presentations, including graduating seniors' works on display the UMF Art Gallery — where gallery goers will also have the opportunity to talk with the artists about their work. In UMF's Olsen Student Center, attendees can hear students read their original writing compositions. There's even a presentation of the works of Shakespeare — as interpreted by Jerry Springer!

7 Hours, 15 Venues, Nearly 100 Presentations, Exhibits and Performances

Each year, Symposium Day showcases a diversity of topics, subject matter, presentations and exhibits from across UMaine Farmington's broad liberal arts spectrum: the arts, education, research, social science, rehabilitation services, service-learning, and more. UMF student James Malley of Westbrook discusses "Class Implications of Genetic Engineering," a presentation of the social class implications of genetic enhancements in children. (1:15 p.m., Room 101, Roberts Learning Center.)
